Historical Sketch

Ruth Talbott was born on August 9, 1909 in the small community of Potomac, Illinois. She was the daughter of Benjamin Alfred and Anna Louvenia Tyler Talbott. She had a brother, Paul and a sister, Mary (married name was Yard). In 1931 Ruth graduated from the Brokaw Hospital Training School and became a registered nurse.

Ruth married Joe Mack Carpenter on October 15, 1932. The couple settled in Shirley, Illinois where Mrs. Carpenter resided for 67 years. Mrs. Carpenter worked various jobs including a private duty nurse, a nurse in a doctor's office, the Fairview T.B. Sanatorium, and a nurse at General Electric in Bloomington, Illinois. Mrs. Carpenter also spent many years cataloging the obituaries for Bloomington-Normal's newspaper, *The Pantagraph*.

Mrs. Carpenter was a member of the Park United Methodist Church, United Methodist Women, Martha Circle and the Crusaders Sunday School Class. Mrs. Carpenter was also a charter member of the McLean County Genealogical Society, the McLean County Historical Society, and the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Joe Mack Carpenter died on August 19, 1976. Mrs. Carpenter moved to Peachtree City, Georgia to live with her nephew a few years before her death on May 29, 2000.

Scope and Content

The Ruth Carpenter Collection contains one box of eighteen individual items and fourteen folders ranging from 1862 to 1995.

The items include various notebooks containing Carpenter's genealogical research on Shirley. The notebooks include notes and many newspaper obituary clippings. There are also various published histories of the sights in Shirley, among them, a short history on the Park United Methodist Church, co-authored by Carpenter. There is a manuscript entitled "A Democratic Prayer" given by the mayor of Irwin at the Democratic Convention (n.d.). Most of the items present refer to the history of Shirley and McLean County, however there are a few personal items: a wooden postcard addressed to Mr. and Mrs. O.V. Douglas, postmarked Biloxi, Mississippi, a payment booklet from J.A. Keck Furniture Co. starting in 1933, a small, black leather account book, and a ration book from World War II.

The folders include maps, newspaper clippings, an essay by a seventh grader about the McIlvain School, more genealogical research, "note of classification" cards pertaining to Mr. Carpenter's military ability, correspondence from Carpenter's sister, Mary J. Yard, and photocopied census records of Shirley in 1995.
