Brief History

Robert Sterzbach was an Army Corporal when his correspondence with Alyne Tracy began on the 13th of January 1944. He was stationed at Camp Ellis, Illinois, which was near Lewistown. Robert came from Mamaroneck, New York. Alice Alyne Tracy was a young Bloomington woman living at 208 E. Front Street and working as a bartender at the Wonder Grill on Front Street when she met Robert. She later worked at Stanley's Tavern (611 N. Main). She was born in Kentucky but moved to Illinois as a young girl. Robert was stationed in Bloomington (refrigeration school) for a short time when Robert and Alyne were seeing each other and was transferred back to Camp Ellis where he was a munitions instructor. Prior to the war Robert worked as a foreman in food production in New York state.

Alyne was one of eight children of William and Lucy Ann Tracy: Mary (born 1899) Harry (1902) married Gladys; Evans Ely (1904), married Orna; Lucille Nell (1907), married Leonard Mayo; Julia Dixine (1909) married Gordon Payne; William (1911), married Wynell Smith; Carter (1913), married Gerald Garfoot; and Alyne (1919). Their correspondence was passed on to Alyne Tracy's nephew, Walter Payne (sister Dixine's son).

Robert had one sister, Dorothy O'Connor. His parents were William and Ida Sterzbach. While Robert was stationed in England his mother died and his father had a serious stroke.

The correspondence here dates from January 13, 1944 to June 5, 1945. Robert and Alyne were married June 19, 1944 in Bloomington, Illinois. Robert was shipped out July 1944 and stationed at an Army Hospital near Swindon, England. Later in life Robert revealed that he was shipped to England on the Queen Mary. Robert enlisted in the army December 14, 1942, and was discharged December 15, 1945.

The residents of the Tracy apartment at different times were Alyne; her mother, Lucy Ann Tracy; Mary (Luallen) Ancona; Lorraine Tracy (niece, daughter of Mary Tracy); Virginia Bush; Jeanne (and her son "little Bill"?) and "Mary and Randall."

Robert returned to Bloomington after the war, and he and Alyne always made their home here. They never had any children, and these letters come to us through Alyne's nephew Walter Payne.

Scope

This collection holds the correspondence between Robert Sterzbach and Alyne Tracy from January 1944 to June 1945.
