#### **Brief History**

Born in 1904, Dorothy M. Washburn was a daughter of M/M George Washburn of Bloomington. George was a principal in the family's flower and seed business. Dorothy graduated Bloomington High School in 1921. She taught some nine years at a junior college in LaSalle, Illinois, before trying to enlist in the WWII efforts. After being rejected by both WAVES and Marines due to poor eyesight, Dorothy enlisted in the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC) in February 1943.

The WAAC had been established by Congress in May 1942 to perform non-combat work, freeing American males to serve in combat. Attracted by the success of the Corps, the Army requested that the WAAC be brought under the direct control of the Army. Congress obliged in July 1943, forming the Women's Army Corps (WAC). All WAACs were allowed the choice to join the Army as a WAC or return to civilian life.

Dorothy trained at Ft. Oglethorpe, GA, and then at Ft. Des Moines, IA. As an officer, her assignments took her from Des Moines to New York City (briefly) and then to New Orleans Air Force Base. Dorothy was ultimately promoted to first lieutenant and taught Army administration at New Orleans alongside various male teachers, mustering out in November 1945.

Family members report that Dorothy returned to teaching in Harvey, Illinois, until her retirement to Bloomington where she died in 1994.

### **Scope Note**

This collection includes items copies of letters from Dorothy to her family during her military service, copies of a memory book related to her service, officer's commission, copies of her diary entries from 1920-24, etc.
